

# The last census tells that ...

## An extra 1.7 million people were working in banking and finance. They mainly live in London.

There are more doctors per person in the South of England than the North and Wales.

The young and educated flood to London while the old, sick and less skilled move out.

There are more dentists per person in some areas of Wales than the rest of the country.

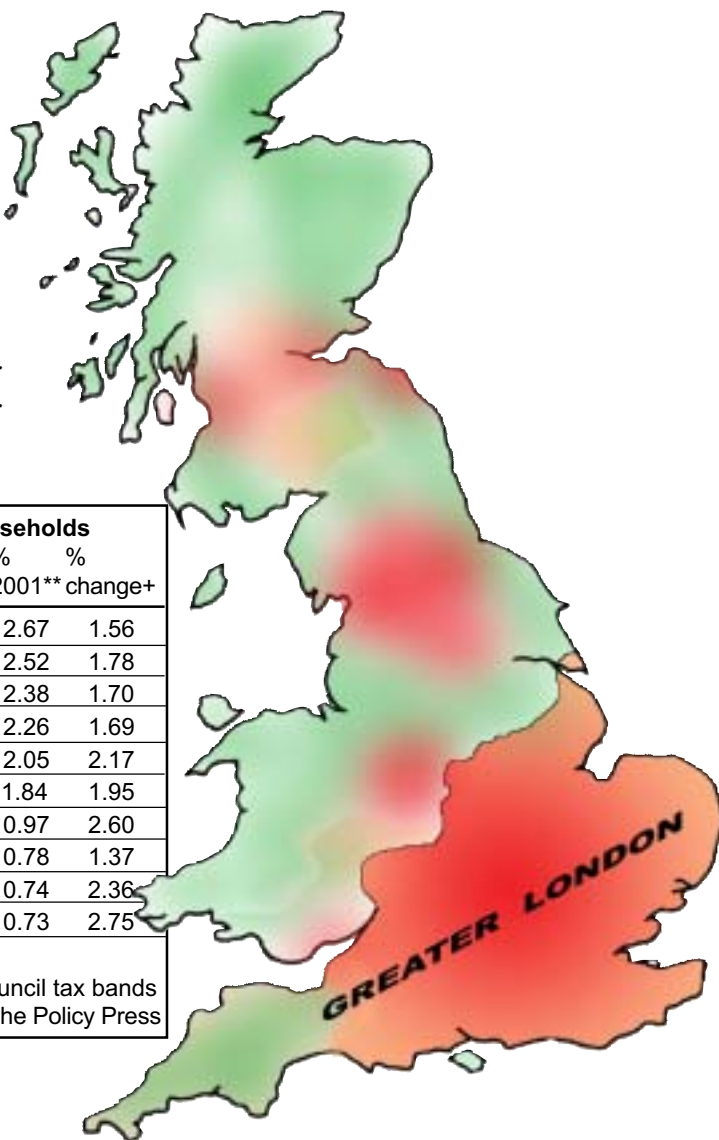
The map shows the area which has come under the influence of Greater London. The brighter the red, the more dense the population, the greener, the lower the population.

The population of most cities in England has fallen. Manchester has lost 10% Liverpool has fallen by 8%.

There are more very rich people living in the South East. They have houses with more than 7 rooms and more than 3 cars.

Poverty is most concentrated in East London and Glasgow. London has the biggest concentration of poor in Western Europe.

London is running out of space for lower earners such as people in sales, customer services and skilled trades like carpenters.
